Evolution of the Society Questionnaire "Three Generations"

Evaluation:

The results of the questionnaire show clear tendencies: the more we look back (from parents to grandparents) the more it shows that...

in everyday life

- ...mostly the husbands were working (rural population excepted).
- ...there was a greater number of children in the families.
- ...people were walking to places more frequently than going by any vehicle whatsoever.
- ...they spent less time on organised activities after school.
- ...they were subordinated to parental decisions as to their outfits.

as far as festivities are concerned

- ... former generations sticked more closely to traditional festivities.
- ...celebrated religious festivities more actively.
- ...all three generatins are and were familiar with main events such as baptism, confirmation, marriage and funerals.

as far as school is concerned

- ...they had less or no lessons in the afternoons.
- ...grandparents had about the same number of pupils in their classes as their grandchildren. (It was the generation of parents that had a strongly elevated number of pupils in their classes due to the high birth rate after the World War II).
- ...there was no school uniform in either generation besides the apron that the grandparents often had to wear.
- ... most astonishingly punishments ressembled each others. It was one generation further back that experienced really drastic (also physical) punishments.

as far as food is concerned

- ...the number of meals hasn't changed much, neither their duration, but "conditions" did. (often family members eat their meals indiviually today).
- ...in former times (among the pupils' grandparents) meals took place together with all the family members.
- ...vegetables were eaten more regularly.
- ...meat was eaten less frequently by the generation of the grandparents (rural population excepted).
- ...more meals that contained a lot of fat were eaten, but less sweats.

as far as social life is concerned

- ...former generations were less frequently allowed to go out and if so, they had to be back home much earlier.
- ...activities did not differ decisively except for 'shopping activities' and —of course- dancing meant something different than it does today.
- ...consumption was -of course- more modeste.
- ...young people of the generation of the pupils' grandparents smoked less and only cigarettes

as far as new technologies are concerned

- ...less hours were spent using technical means of communication.
- ...more direct contacts took place.
- ...there were more close friendships due to the fact that contacts couldn't be replaced easily by chat-friends.

Evidently the above results can also be interpreted vice versa, if we point out the characteristics of the actual generation.
